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1. Introduction

The ArtsXchange College aims to provide a warm and welcoming environment. We are dedicated to supporting vulnerable young people and it is central to our ethos that we are committed to providing a building, grounds and services that are fully accessible to everyone.

This includes all students, staff, parents, volunteers and visitors, regardless of their circumstances and needs. Every aspect of our work focuses on removing barriers to learning and development and in this spirit, we are committed to challenging negative attitudes about disability and accessibility, and we actively promote a culture of awareness, tolerance and inclusion.

The refurbishment of the City Road building in 2021 reflects our commitment to providing a physically accessible environment to support our inclusiveness ethos.

2. Aims

Schools (Colleges) are required under the Equality Act 2010 to have an accessibility plan. The purpose of the plan is to:

- Increase the extent to which disabled students can participate in the curriculum
- Improve the physical environment of the college to enable disabled students to take better advantage of education, benefits, facilities and services provided
- Improve the availability of accessible information to disabled students

Our college aims to treat all its students fairly and with respect. This involves providing access and opportunities for all students without discrimination of any kind.

The plan will be made available online on the college website, and paper copies are available upon request.

Our college is also committed to ensuring staff are trained in equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010, including understanding disability issues.

The college supports any available partnerships to develop and implement the plan.

Our college's complaints procedure covers the accessibility plan. If you have any concerns relating to accessibility in college, this procedure sets out the process for raising these concerns.

3. Legislation and guidance

This document meets the requirements of [schedule 10 of the Equality Act 2010](#) and the Department for Education (DfE) [guidance for schools on the Equality Act 2010](#).

The Equality Act 2010 defines an individual as disabled if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that has a 'substantial' and 'long-term' adverse effect on his or her ability to undertake normal day to day activities.

Under the [Special Educational Needs and Disability \(SEND\) Code of Practice](#), 'long-term' is defined as 'a year or more' and 'substantial' is defined as 'more than minor or trivial'. The definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, epilepsy and cancer.

Schools are required to make 'reasonable adjustments' for pupils with disabilities under the Equality Act 2010, to alleviate any substantial disadvantage that a disabled pupil faces in comparison with non-disabled pupils. This can include, for example, the provision of an auxiliary aid or adjustments to premises.

This policy complies with our funding agreement and articles of association.
